# **Achieving the SDG on Health: The Potential of Health System Strengthening**

## **Background**

In September 2015, Member States of the United Nations have adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which includes the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These goals will serve as the main framework for development cooperation until 2030. They will guide efforts for the realisation of the human right to health.

The MDGs prioritised health with three out of eight goals and a clear focus on maternal and reproductive health (MDG 5), child health (MDG 4) as well as combatting infectious diseases (MDG 6). While important progress has been made on all of the MDGs in the past 15 years, these three goals remain alarmingly off track, while other important aspects of sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) were not even addressed by the MDGs. Health, including SRHR, will remain an important issue within the SDG-framework not least because health is a main driver of sustainable development and poverty reduction.

Women, adolescent girls and children are the most vulnerable groups to failures and shortcomings in a health system. Maternal, neonatal and child health indicators can serve as proxy indicators for a country's health system performance and the realisation of the human right to health. Only in a world where every pregnancy is wanted, every birth is safe, and every young person's potential is fulfilled, global health and sustainable development can truly be achieved.

Well-functioning health systems are key to secure sexual and reproductive health and rights as well as maternal and child health. However, there is an ongoing discussion on the priority elements of health systems strengthening – especially on which measures are essential to deliver better results – and on how to best implement them.
